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Chairperson's Report

The 10th Anniversary Celebration of the AEA's founding held on May 5, 2005 in Lower Manhattan was a resounding success. We had a great turnout from a good cross-section of the Engineering Community as well as representation from the political establishment. Mayor Bloomberg sent a representative from his administration to convey his greetings and best wishes to AEA (see Mayor's letter below). Following the remarks by the Mayor's representative, Council Member Hiram Monserrate gave the attendees an update on the status of the "Infrastructure Proposal" legislation.

Our guest speaker for the evening was Francis J. Lombardi, PE, Chief Engineer of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. Mr. Lombardi gave a rousing presentation on the role of Engineering Leadership in delivering successful projects. We also gave the Cornerstone Award to George Golovchenko, PE for his many years of dedicated and unselfish service to the Profession. The evening closed with further "mingling" and networking. The atmosphere and mood of the evening was so congenial that our guests did not want to leave.

One of the highlights of the evening was Council Member Monserrate's report to the attendees on the status of AEA's Infrastructure Proposal. Currently, Councilmember Monserrate's office is drafting legislation that will turn into legislation our Infrastructure Proposal calling for a Deputy Mayor for Infrastructure. This legislation will be introduced into NY City Council on August 17, 2005. As soon as this happens, we will be mobilizing our colleagues in the Engineering and Architectural Community to support our legislative effort by calling, writing or e-mailing their respective Council Members as well as the Mayor. We will provide the contact information for our members and colleagues. Check our website for updates and alerts.

In addition to galvanizing support from the Engineering and Architectural Community, we will also try to enlist the support of other stakeholders from professional and good government organizations to citizens groups and community boards. We will also try to get the media to profile our legislation and educate the public on the merits of our legislation. New York City desperately needs a Deputy Mayor for Infrastructure who will oversee the management of the entire infrastructure of the City.

If we can accomplish this dramatic change in the way the City manages its infrastructure, the citizens of this City will benefit greatly, and the Engineering Profession will finally emerge from the shadows and take its rightful place in the political establishment.

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I would like to emphasize the importance of this AEA initiative. If we are successful in establishing the position of Deputy Mayor for Infrastructure for New York City we will literally transform the Engineering landscape. We will be pioneering something that this City and the rest of the country needs, namely the efficient and cost-effective management of the infrastructure by technically competent professionals. Once we demonstrate the efficacy of our Infrastructure Proposal, we can then push for its adoption by other cities across the nation. It might sound overly optimistic but our efforts here in New York can result in reversing the general trend among government entities of replacing technical professionals with technically illiterate managers.

AEA has put a lot of effort in implementing the Infrastructure Proposal. The board views this effort as key to achieving success in other areas. For this reason a disproportionate amount of resources have gone into it. Once we achieve this objective, the AEA will be perceived as a major player, not only by our sister societies but by the political establishment as well. This recognition and status will accelerate accomplishing our other objectives.

Although we have concentrated a lot of our energies on the Infrastructure Proposal, AEA has undertaken other initiatives and activities. AEA has continued joint actions with other Engineering Societies, continued to assist Engineers at risk, advocated for the proper use of Engineers and technicians by government entities, expanded efforts to engage and enlist Academia and forged alliances with other Engineering societies.

In the coming months AEA will continue pursuing its various initiatives and activities. As our resources expand, so too will our efforts to improve our Profession. If you share our dream of a unified and influential Profession, join us on this noble and exciting journey.
